### **President Laura's Post**

***“Rejoice in Hope; Be patient in Tribulation; Be Constant in Prayer”***  
***Romans 12:12***

May 2, 2020 was to be the day for our convention! I did not know it then, but I would have been installed as your new president on that day What a day it would have been! I would have been surrounded by my Sisters in Christ and received lots of hugs! I missed you all that weekend as well as the servant events, mission speakers, and the fellowship in the Word. I *Rejoice in the Hope* that I will see some of you soon, possibly at the rallies, at the retreat, or maybe next year at the conventions both at the district and national level.

I have often thought about God's plan in allowing me to be a rally speaker last year. If you remember, we spoke of CHANGE. Little did we know that change would happen, whether we wanted it or not. What were some of the changes you had to endure this year? Did you start watching church on your TV or computer? Did you get to watch more than one service? Maybe that was a good change. Did you stay at home and stay safe? How did you spend your time? Did you increase your devotional time? I did, and that has truly been a comfort and help to me in these turbulent times. Did you spend time ridding your closets of unused clothes and shoes possibly knowing these items could help others in need. This was another good change.

Some of the difficulties of the times were not being able to see our families, both genetic and church families. The loneliness became oppressive at times. Some of us learned how to do Zoom meetings with our families and friends. Some of us even enjoyed Bible studies on Zoom. This was also a good change. I am an “essential worker” and was able to work during the lockdown. I was able to see people and go out, but even that was a change. There was no traffic on the highway. Suddenly, the Emergency Room was not full. The patients that did come in were potential Covid 19 patients. For the first time in years, I experienced more anxiety in my job. However, even that was a good change because it taught me to be *Constant in prayer*.

Remember the Choluteca Bridge in Honduras from our presentations last year? The river moved? Our river has certainly moved this year. We have had to think about how to do things differently. We have been forced to make changes that we normally would not have done. Considering this, the fall rallies are a perfect example of how things will be changing a little this year. **Working Together** is the theme of this year's rally. When we work together, we can accomplish all that needs to be done. Social distancing and food offerings may have to change. Half day meetings instead of all day may be the change that is needed this year. Different ways to have snacks and fellowship might be part of the agenda. If people are at risk, they may stay home and watch it later. We will be videotaping the rallies and posting them on that **zone's portal** on [lwmlcid.org](http://lwmlcid.org). Maybe those we ask to help us out with the technological things will find that they want to know more about LWML. Would not that be a good change!

Change is hard, and it is scary. It is uncomfortable, and “we’ve never done it that way before”. There are some things that NEVER change. God’s amazing grace and protection of us NEVER fails. Thanks be to God! God’s work of salvation NEVER stops. His Word still needs to go out to all nations. We must NEVER stop being lights to our neighbors, our friends, and our families. We do these things at the rallies, hearing of our mission grants, coming together as Lutheran Women in Mission, with the main goal of “bringing the lost and erring into eternal fellowship with Him”. We must elect our new officers. It may be that some people need to vote through email. Some may think of all these changes as a tribulation. We must be *Patient in Tribulation*. Go to God in prayer in all things and put all our fears and anxieties on Him. Psalm 56:3-4 states “*When I am afraid, I put my trust in you. In God, whose word I praise, in God I trust, I shall not be afraid. What can flesh do to me?*”

As we get ready for the rallies and look forward to our retreat on Oct 9-10, 2020, let us be ready to “Grab Our Shoes and Go” (this year’s retreat theme). Let us be ready to do the Lord’s work and go boldly in the Way. Trusting in the Lord that whatever happens, it is His will and His plan for us.

# Mission Grants

The LWML CID is overjoyed to announce its mission goal for 2020-2021 of \$105,000 with \$78,750 for district grants and the remaining funds to national mission grants. Please help publicize information about these Mission Grants at regular meetings as well as in church bulletins and newsletters throughout the next year. Listed below are the first three.

## **August 2020 LWML CID Mission Grant #1**

Student Aid for Church Workers - \$30,000

Due to the high cost of becoming a full-time church worker, many students find it difficult to complete their schooling. This grant will provide partial funding to CID students so they may realize their dreams of becoming full-time church workers. These funds will be distributed through the LCMS CID Scholarship Committee. How can I help? Pray that God provides men and women willing to become church workers to spread the Gospel message throughout the world.

## **September 2020 LWML CID Mission Grant #2**

Operation Mercy for Veterans in Danville - \$10,000

The purpose of Operation Mercy is to show God's mercy to our Veterans by feeding their bodies, caring for their souls, and creating a community of fellow citizens and Christian believers at Cannon Place and the Danville Senior Apartments. This grant would help purchase food for the on-site food pantry and holiday meals and continue the worship services, Bible studies, and Sunday school for veterans and their families. How can I help? Pray that God provides the Danville veterans with the love of God and a sense of community through this grant.

## **October 2020 LWML CID Mission Grant #3 –**

“Food for the Children” program in Danville - \$10,000

“Food for the Children” program supplies food on the weekends for students identified by school social workers, who have no or little food during that time. All funds would be used for the purchase of food for the weekend bags. Jesus is introduced to the students through pencils, prayer placemats, bookmarks, and Christian mementos. How can I help? Pray that God uses the “Food for the Children” program to bring these children and their families into His kingdom.

How many meetings have you attended that as soon as “bylaws” is mentioned, the eyes glaze over and the mind tunes out? Whether it is for LWML, your local congregation, or any professional or civic organization, bylaws/structure are necessary. They are the guidelines for the organization’s smooth functioning. Bylaws do not exist to take the fun out of being a member, but rather, to structure all members’ activities in order to promote cooperation and working together. They are the mutually agreed upon rules of operation, and the rules to change the rules.

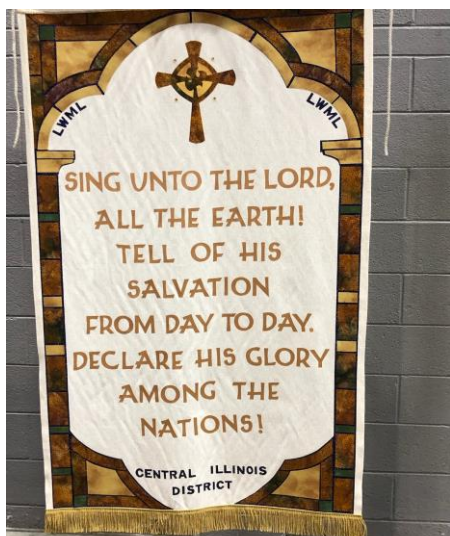
Think of revising the bylaws as home improvement. Every so often, it is time to re-paint, maybe remodel the kitchen or bathroom or create more space for the expanding family. Maybe smaller touches like new pillows or pictures, a new recliner or furniture, a new TV or upgraded technology is your desire. These big and little touches in separate parts of the house make the whole house more livable.

Bylaws also need to be reviewed occasionally to update job descriptions or terminology (“groups” replace “societies”, etc.). Updates are not meant to be nitpicky (although it may seem like it), but to connect the separate parts of the bylaws into a unified whole that gives direction, guidance, and even vitality to an organization. Bylaws tell us what needs to be done, not all the details of how to do it. Within the bylaws is a lot of freedom in how we hold fall rallies and district conventions, how board members do their jobs of recruiting young women, publish *The Clarion*, or develop future leaders within LWML CID.

One action that Robert’s Rules of Order encourages is that everyone involved in any organization “should become familiar with the contents of these rules (*bylaws, standing rules, etc.*) if he/she looks toward full participation in the society’s affairs” (RONR (11<sup>th</sup> ed.), p. 15). You know the nooks and crannies of your own home. Get to know the nooks and crannies of the LWML CID bylaws! It really is not an “eye glazing” experience!
